Why Preschool Matters

Learning gaps begin before kindergarten

A great preschool program can benefit any child. But early learning efforts are especially important to ensure the success of low-income students, who often start behind their more affluent peers.

Before age five, 90% of a child's brain develops



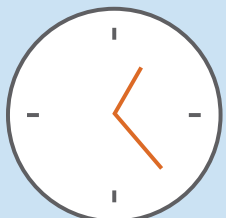

Low-income children hear up to 30 million fewer words than their more affluent peers before entering school



Nine vs. 22

By age five, a typical middle-class child recognizes 22 letters compared to nine for a child in a low-income family



975

A low-income child has 975 fewer hours of one-on-one picture book reading than their middle-class peers

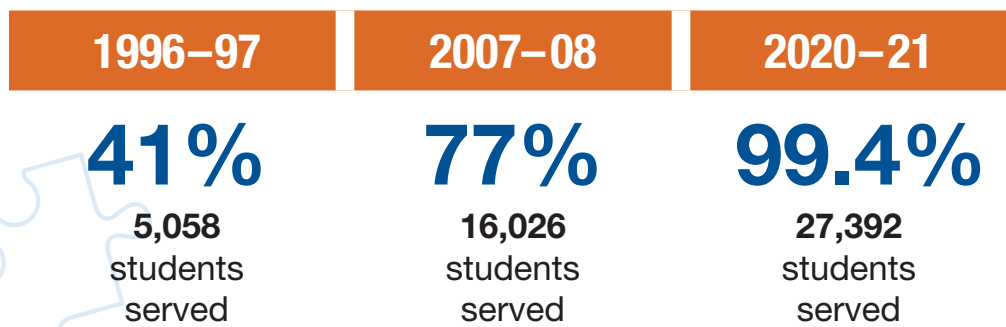
Children benefit from increased earnings in adulthood, while the public sees returns in the form of reduced special education, welfare, and crime costs, and increased tax revenues from participants later in life.

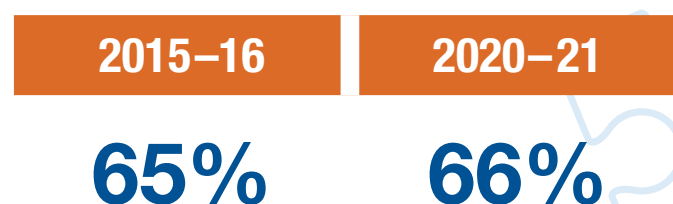
