2022 IASB Legislative Priorities



Dropout/At Risk

IASB supports the elimination of the per pupil inequity in dropout prevention and at-risk funding by allowing districts to request the maximum per pupil rate. For almost a decade, 199 school districts have been unable to generate the same amount of funds as other school districts, due to caps put in place by the legislature. These caps have hurt schools' efforts to provide needed services to keep students in school and graduate.



Mental Health

IASB supports continuing the progress that was made on children's mental health last session. We need to ensure students have access to quality mental health providers, a dedicated funding stream, and ongoing training for teachers and staff.



Teacher Recruitment & Licensure

IASB supports efforts to address lowa's teacher shortage. It is important that districts be given the flexibility and resources to attract and retain a high-quality workforce to educate our students. We support expansion of student loan forgiveness programs, stipends for student teachers, and a streamlined and less expensive alternative pathway for qualified individuals to change careers and become educators.



School Funding

Timely, adequate and equitable funding are essential at a time when there is so much uncertainty around schools. IASB calls for legislators to provide funding that ensures districts can responsibly plan and budget for upcoming years, especially when enrollment is unpredictable.



Supplemental State Aid

IASB calls for legislators to make their decisions on growth in school funding by the deadlines set in law so that schools can responsibly plan local budgets. Legislators must also ensure the rate of growth is sufficient to support local district efforts to plan, create and sustain world-class schools.
