


## **Unequal District Cost Per Pupil Amounts**

During the past three legislative sessions, the General Assembly has worked to address the differences between school districts' regular program district cost per pupil (DCPP). The regular program district cost per pupil amount funds the school district's regular program and generally accounts for about 70.0% of the funding generated through the school aid formula. However, there is an inequity among per pupil amounts. The difference between the highest and lowest per pupil amounts has been reduced to \$145, down from \$175 prior to the equity legislation of the past four years.

## Remaining Differences in the District Cost Per Pupil

The additional \$30 added to the state cost per pupil (SCPP) amount and DCPP the past four years has reduced the range between the minimum and maximum DCPP from \$175 to \$145. For FY 2022, 216 (66.1%) have a DCPP that is equal to the SCPP (\$7,227) and is \$145 below the maximum DCPP (5 districts are at \$7,372). The following map details each district's DCPP differential compared to the SCPP. Districts in red have a \$0 differential (the DCPP=SCPP) while the districts in green are at the maximum level (DCPP=\$7,372) and are \$145 above the SCPP.

## **Breakdown of Different DCPP Amounts**

The following table provides interesting information based on the different DCPP level. Information of note:

- There are 60.2% of the districts where the DCPP = SCPP representing 72.0% of the total enrollment in Iowa.
- There are 12 districts in the top two categories representing 3.6% of the total districts and 0.8% of the total enrollment.
- Districts that have a DCPP that is greater than the SCPP fund that differential entirely from local property taxes, which totals \$6.8 million across the state.
- Districts that have a DCPP that is less than the maximum DCPP (\$7,372) would generate \$75.3 million in additional funding if their individual DCPP amounts were increased to the maximum level.
- If the legislature continues to reduce the difference in the district cost per pupil amounts, districts at the high end of the DCPP levels may not receive much (or any) of an increase in funding but will continue to receive additional property tax relief.

"Amount of Property Tax to Fund DCPP>SCPP" provides the additional amount of property tax generated to fund the amount where the DCPP exceeds the SCPP.

In addition to the differences in the regular program DCPP noted above, there are also differences in the cost per pupil amounts for the teacher salary supplement, professional development supplement, early intervention supplement and the area education agency (AEA) per pupil amounts.
